

On Experience: Practicum Seminar on Otherness, Work, and Culture EDUCO

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Course Description

This course provides a theoretical framework for students engaged in an shadow internship or volunteer project during the semester. Your 55 to 100 hours of experiential project will feed our reflections on the relationship between Self and Other in the French context, the perception and management of difference, the construction and value of work, the legal codes that define the rights and responsabilities of employees and employers, the techniques of observation and mindfulness à la française, as well as the very representation and definition of discovery in the literary, cinematographic and sociological fields.

Our analysis of texts and your experience will be complemented by co-curruicular visits to museums such as the Musée de l'Homme and the Musée national de l'histoire de l'immigration, as well as by lectures and screenings of selected films.

Our course focuses on your experience and your project. Your own experience and observations are of prime importance, and will feed into our analysis of the texts studied. So, as with any course, attendance and participation are essential.

Learning Objectives

- Give you the theoretical and practical tools you need to make the most of your experiential project.
- Understand the challenges of intercultural communication in the French context.
- Explore the logics of identity and otherness in French thought and culture.
- Discover the culture and value of work in France today, as well as the rights and duties of workers and employers.
- Understand work as a battlefield in the struggle for equality.

Assessments and duties

- 1) A PPT presentation of your experiential project. 10-15 minutes. 15%
- 2) A final presentation with PPT at the end of the course, relating what you have learned and observed. 10-15 minutes. 15%
- 3) Two essays of 5 to 7 pages that weave together your experiential project, the visits and interventions, and the texts studied. 40%
- 4) A written internship report synthesizing what you've learned from the texts you've studied. 5 to 7 pages. Plus a logbook describing your experiential project. 30%

Attendance and Participation



Your participation and attendance are essential for this course to take shape. Be on time and ready to share your observations, analyses and experiences.

If you are absent, you will need to provide an official document to justify your absence (a medical certificate, for example). For two unjustified absences, your final mark will drop by one point (a 14/20 will become a 13/20; a 15/20 will become a 14/20). Three unjustified absences will result in a 0/20 for the course. EDUCO policy prohibits the use of AI and tools such as ChatGPT in the production of assignments. Your essays and oral presentations must be of your own creation, and anything that does not come directly from you must be cited and acknowledged according to the rules in force.

Course Schedule

Week 1

Course presentation. Explanation of the context of your experiential project. Structured visit to the Musée de l'Homme (Paris 16th, Metro Trocadéro (line 9)): What is a human being? How can we observe human activity? How can we represent the great diversity of humanity?

If you can't attend the Musée de l'Homme visit, you'll have to go yourself at a time that suits you.

Week 2

Discuss your options. Prepare CV, cover letter and interview. Reflections on the visit to the Musée de l'Homme. Discussion of Beauvoir's Subject and the Other, and Lévi-Strauss's ethnographic structuralism. Structured tour of the Musée du Quai Branly (Métro léna (line 9), 7th arrondissement).
